PUBLIC HEARING ASHLAND SEWER REIMBURSEMENT NEWDOLL

ITEM

Public Hearing to review the cost spread of developer-installed sewer lines in Ashland Lane and approving the reimbursement costs for this project.

BACKGROUND

Mr. Robert Newdoll, developer, has installed sewer lines in Ashland Lane and has requested reimbursement for the improvements which benefit others.

At the regular meeting held on August 15, 2001, your Honorable Board set September 19, 2001 for a Public Hearing to review the cost spread of installation of off-site improvements in Ashland Lane. Notices have been sent to each of the property owners informing them of their reimbursement costs if they wish to connect to the installed sewer line. To date, no protests have been received by the District.

The developer has presented the District with invoices for the cost of construction of the sewer line in Ashland Lane. The costs have been spread to lots which benefit from the improvements (shown on Exhibit A- Sewer Reimbursement Diagram.) The pro rata share for each lot is \$8.081.60.

Now is the time to hold a Public Hearing to receive any comments on the sewer reimbursement. After the comment period, the Board may consider approving the pro rata share cost per lot.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends that your Honorable Board, after the Public Hearing, adopt the attached resolution approving the reimbursement amount for the Ashland Lane sewer line improvements.

R. H. Newdoll Construction Co. (developer) has installed a sewer line in Ashland Lane and has requested reimbursement for some of the costs. The District accepted the Offer of Dedication and the sewer improvements on July 18, 2001

Pursuant to District Code Section 5.01.010, any lot or property, which in the future may be served by this sewer line, will be required to reimburse the Developers a pro-rated share of the cost of constructing the sewer line. The District has determined that your property is to be included in the developer-installed sewer reimbursement area. Attached is a copy of the reimbursement boundary area and sewer reimbursement spread. The cost is spread equally among all the lots. This spread is made per buildable size lot regardless of the number of lots owned.

The Board of Directors set a Public Hearing on the proposed reimbursement allocations for Wednesday, September 19, 2001 at 10:30 a.m. in the District Board Room at 148 South Wilson Street, Nipomo, California. The Board will take public testimony before making their final determination on the proposed reimbursement allocation.

If you wish to protest your pro-rated share, the reason for your protest must be in writing and received at the District office no later than 14 calendar days from the date of this notice. A protest will be considered only with the division or spread of the actual construction costs between or among the properties to be included in the area subject to the pro-ration procedure. A protest shall not be concerned with the actual construction costs unless the protester can demonstrate fraud or willful concealment of the actual cost information as presented by the applicant or his agent to the District's engineer. The reimbursement period expires ten years after the District's acceptance of the improvements.

If you connect to the sewer line, the District will require you to pay the Ashland Lane and Southland Street sewer reimbursement fee, as well as the District's standard Sewer Capacity Fee per lot. The Sewer Capacity Fee is currently \$2,500 per single family unit.



BACKGROUND


The District received a letter from J. M. McGillis, representing the developer of Tract 2336, requesting annexation to the District for water and sewer services. The proposed annexation, as shown on the attached map, lies within the California Cities water service area.

Since this tract is within the California Cities area, the applicant would need an agreement to detach this area from Cal Cities service area or some type of financial transaction may be required for this to be accomplished.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends that the applicant resolve the matter of water service jurisdiction before the District proceeds with the annexation request.

Honorable Board of Directors

I am writing this letter to ask your position on a possible annexation. I have enclosed a reduced copy of Tract 2336. We are very close to recording this map. It is served, for water, by Cal Cities. Although I think you would have to relax your annexation policies before we would be interested in applying for annexation, it would make a lot of practical sense to annex this tract. This is a 41 lot subdivision with Lots 1 and 41 having existing homes and water service from Cal Cities. The other 39 lots will be approximately ½ acres on septic. This project is across Division Street from the Galaxy Mobil Home Park, presently served by County Service Area 10, and I understand you will soon be annexing the Mobil Home Park.

The following is a list of reasons to annex Tract 2336:

- A. User fees. The future residents of Tract 2336 will pay approximately \$13,000.00 per year for water.
- B. Control of water. Tract 2336 will be using water from the Nipomo basin in any case. If you annex and control, future rationing and cost will be controlled by NCSD.
- C. It may be plausible to sewer Tract 2336, at least the 39 new lots, thereby generating even further revenue.

Reasons for the future residents of Tract 2336 to desire to be annexed:


- A. Future complaints can be lodged in Nipomo rather than Santa Maria or San Dimas.
- B. Cal Cities still uses ductile iron pipes for their distribution system. Ductile iron pipes are more likely to rupture during an earthquake, making them a less reliable source. They also have more problems with rust etc. making the quality less desirable.
- C. Local control is simply better, in any future decisions.

Please schedule this subject for a public hearing.

boundary Request for water outside the District and sewer service at 427 Amado Street, Nipomo.

BACKGROUND

The District has received a letter from the Nunez family requesting water and sewer service to a parcel located at 427 Amado Street in Nipomo. This parcel is adjacent to but outside the District boundary, therefore, it would require LAFCO approval before providing service. At the regular meeting held on January 3, 2001, your Honorable Board approved sewer service to a neighboring property (447/449 Amado St., also outside the District boundary) which is presently receiving District water service, therefore, it did not require LAFCO consideration.

For the District to provide water and sewer service to this parcel, the following would be required:

- LAFCO approval for annexation or outside user agreement
- Approval by your Honorable Board to provide service to this property.
- Retrofitting eight (8) homes to create sufficient water supply for existing residents
- Pay all the appropriate water & sewer fees associated with the request

RECOMMENDATION

If your Honorable Board wishes to provide water and sewer services to 427 Amado Street in Nipomo, staff recommends directing staff to write a letter to applicant outlining procedure and associated costs to provide service to this parcel.



The Board of Directors of the Nipomo Community Services District considered your request to connect two residences on your out-of-District property at 447 and 449 Amado Street to the District-wide sewer collector system. The Board approved the connection with the following conditions:

- The property owner must pay all the appropriate fees for connecting to the District's sewer system. The current Sewer Capacity Fee is \$2,370.00. July 1, 2001, the Fee will increase to \$2,500.00
- There will be an Outside District Sewer User Rate of 130% of the In-District Sewer User Rate.
- The In-District Sewer User Rate is \$18.00 per month. Your rate would be \$23.40 per month, billed bi-monthly as you are now on your water bill.

Since no one came to the meetings nor has anyone inquired lately, we are not sure if you are still interested in connecting to the sewer system. If you still wish to connect with the above conditions, you may contact the office between 8:00 a.m. and 4:30 p.m.

BACKGROUND


The District received a letter from Pedro Nunez requesting emergency hook-up to the District's sewer system due to failure of their on-site waste disposal system. The Nunez's are presently receiving water service from the District as an Outside District Boundary User. There presently exists a water and sewer line in front of their property to which a sewer lateral could be connected. When the District notified LAFCO of its latent powers, there were three properties outside the District boundary which were being served by the District. The Nunez property is one of the three properties. It is believed that since the District has notified LAFCO of the services that the District could proceed to provide sewer services to these same properties that are receiving water services.

Presently, the District does not have an Outside District Boundary Sewer User rate for individual service.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends that your Honorable Board approve sewer service to the two residences on one parcel at 447 & 449 Amado Street, APN 092-231-010 and direct staff to establish an Outside District Sewer User Rate. The property owner must pay all the appropriate fees for connecting to the District sewer system.



BACKGROUND



TELEVISING BOARD MEETINGS

ITEM

Review proposal to televise District Board meetings.

BACKGROUND

The District has requested a proposal from AGP Video to televise regular District Board meetings of the Nipomo Community Services District. These productions would be shown on the Charter Cable Network on Channel 61. The proposal indicates that the cost per regular Board meeting would be \$400+. A special meeting would cost \$125 per hour with a two-hour minimum or \$250+.

Some of the pros and cons of televising Board meetings:

Since the SLO County receives the franchise fees for cable television operations outside the incorporated area, it is suggested that the County should be contacted about funding Special District Board meetings.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends that your Honorable Board direct staff to contact the County to see if they would be interested in supporting the costs associated with televising local non-incorporated Special District Board meetings.

District Board meetings

Enclosed is our proposal for Video Production and Tape Distribution Services for the NCSD Board meetings. We gather there is interest on the part of the Board to have its meetings taped for cablecast on the Charter Government Access and Issues Channel, Channel 61 as of this date, to be on Channel 21 beginning September 5, 2001.

As the first video production company in the county to specialize in taping and cablecasting government meetings, we have seen the benefit to both the governmental bodies and the community that televised access brings. The community rapidly becomes more informed, understanding the process of how decisions are made. Public comment on issues tends to become more substantial, and timely, as individuals are more thoroughly educated through television exposure. Many individuals have told us they would like to get to their local government meetings, but due to busy lives filled with work and family, they are unable to do so. However, they do watch the meetings on television in impressive numbers, and are very grateful to have that in opportunity in the jurisdictions we already serve.

Our proposal to the Nipomo Community Services District has two elements. In addition to our superior skills as video producers of government meetings, we are also the operations manager for the Charter Countywide Government and Issues Channel. Charter Communications has over 3,300 subscribers in Nipomo with a potential viewing population within the community of three to four times that amount. In our proposal, we discuss the minimum amount of times the NCSD Board meeting be cablecast. Given that the channel is programmed 24/7, the number of times an individual meeting will be cablecast is much higher. In addition, we provide the library with a copy of the tape, and would be willing to provide an additional copy or copies if demand warrants it.

Please take a look at the attached proposal. Our bid is based on our estimate of the average length of the NCSD meetings. We would be glad to meet with you to discuss our proposal or to negotiate on any particular points. You and the Board may wish to consider our contracting for our services for the first year in a "pilot project." Low Power, Low Payoff

very year, untold numbers of earnest conference session hours are devoted to around-the-table hand-wringing by state and local officials over the serious matter of how to bring government and citizens closer together. The goal of that increased familiarity, say the hand-wringers, is to create a more engaged and active citizenry, on the one hand; a citizenry that, not incidentally, might be more willing to support major bond issues for schools, roads and open space protection, on the other.

So along comes the federal government—that Great Satan of mandates and preemption—and hands state and local governments a gift, one that would give the complaining governments a cheap and effective vehicle for making the citizen-government connection. What happens? The states and localities never even bother to pull the wrapper off the package.

The gift in this case was the result of a hard-fought battle over low-power FM radio broadcasting, a fight that started in 1996 and dragged on until the spring of last year. Its origin was a proposal by William E. Kennard, then-chairman of the Federal Communications Commission, to grant new FCC licenses to FM radio stations broadcasting anemic signals aimed very locally, signals that could spread a message out to the community but wouldn't interfere with the noise being made by the FM big boys in the same market.

The proposal seems to have been initiated by equal parts guilt and pragmatism. On the guilt side, Kennard apparently felt some queasiness about the largely unfettered rights granted to politically highpowered FM stations under the 1996 Telecommunications Act, which blew the caps off the tight restriction on the number of stations one person or company could own in a given market. On the pragmatic side, low-power FM was already a growing phenomenon, fueled by dozens of "pirate" stations operating nationwide without FCC licenses, stations frequently devoted to down-home news,

music and commentary aimed at very specific communities in a tightly defined geographical area.

Predictably, Kennard's proposal was met with a barrage of initial criticism from a mattress factory's worth of strange bedfellows. The spectacle of shock jocks, NPR and heavy metal piling under the sheets with Christian Right radio was a sight to behold.

Ultimately, though, a compromise was worked out, whereby low-power licenses would be granted to stations that were at least .4 on the FM dial away from all other conventional FM stations in a market (that is, a 90.3 could locate between an 88.9 and a 90.7).

While no detailed analysis has been done of the organizations and individuals that have applied for licenses, all it takes is a cursory buzz through the applicant lists on the FCC Web site to see who has and hasn't seized the opportunity to become more effective local communicators. And it's very obvious that state

and local governments are not even remotely prominent among those who've applied for licenses. For the most part it's been local colleges, universities and religious groups.

In an era when government officials are especially harsh in their criticism of the press for not covering government well. what better opportunity to get their word out than having a radio station devoted to the business of government? Yes, there are some state and local jurisdictions that already avail themselves of local-access cable channels. But what more natural fit for a city council or a state legislature than to broadcast over its own low-power FM station to every radio in town, turning over unused broadcast time to wider topics, such as announcements of hearings, voting and voter registration opportunities, information on pending bond issues, zoning debates and vaccination schedules.

Even in some large cities, it turns out some space remains for low-power FM: three frequencies ended up being available in Philadelphia. In Phoenix, a Spanish church has applied for the one available frequency, according to the M Street Journal, a biweekly that covers the radio world. Meanwhile, San Diego is witnessing a fierce fight for its single open frequency, and government is not among the combatants.

To date, in fact, it appears that the only governmental enti-



ties with the foresight to apply for licenses have been state transportation departments, including those in Georgia, New Mexico, New York and Vermont. They plan to use low-power FM to broadcast travel advisories.


It amounts to a sad commentary on the energy and imagination of state and local governments in telling their story, especially if state and local officials are sincere when they say they want to reconnect with the citizenry. And for a governmental interest group that in the mind of Washington is more often whining than working out its own problems, the message being broadcast here is loud and clear: The federal actions that states and localities care about are those that can be measured in money. What that attitude adds up to in this case is a significant Washington-sponsored opportunity gone with the wind.

ITEM

The District has received a request from Mr. Ron Edwards to provide landscaping services for his development on Tefft Street across from the Dana Elementary School.

BACKGROUND

The County of San Luis Obispo is beginning to require developments to provide landscaping within the street right-of-way of developments within Nipomo. This landscaping can be maintained by 1) the County, 2) homeowner's association or 3) a local entity such as NCSD. Presently, it is believed that the latent powers that the District does not include maintenance of landscaping. Special legislation would be needed to acquire this authority. Under Section 61601.21 of the Government Code, the State Legislator has granted Jurupa Community Service District this additional purpose in their enabling power to provide such service. If the Board wishes to proceed in this matter, they may direct staff to prepare the necessary resolution and contact our State representative(s) to process legislation giving the NCSD the additional powers to provide landscaping services.

This may be appropriate for this District to look into this service due to the Olde Towne development may require landscaping and other future developments within the District and possible the center meridian of Tefft Street may require such services.

Landscaping service(s) could be funded through benefit zones.

RECOMMENDATION

If the Board wishes to proceed in this matter, they may direct staff to prepare the necessary resolution and contact our representative(s) to process legislation giving the NCSD the additional powers to provide landscaping services.

COMMUNITY SERVICES DISTRICTS

§ 61601.21. Adoption of additional purpose; installation or maintenance of landscaping

Notwithstanding Sections 61600 and 61601, whenever the Board of Directors of the Jurupa Community Services District determines, by resolution, that it is feasible, economically sound, and in the public interest for the district to exercise its powers for the purpose of installing or planting and maintaining landscaping within public street rights-of-way or easements within the district, the board may adopt that additional purpose by resolution, and thereafter the powers of the district may be exercised for that purpose. The district shall, for the purpose of installing or planting and maintaining landscaping, be authorized to provide for and accomplish that purpose through proceedings pursuant to the Landscaping and Lighting Act of 1972 (Part 2 (commencing with Section 22500) of Division 15 of the Streets and Highways Code).



ITEM

At the regular Board meeting held on September 5, 2001, the Board briefly discussed comments printed in the local paper from SLO Board Supervisor, Achadjian (Katcho). The comment was "Regardless of what the Board of Supervisors does, the Cambria Community Services District has control of the water will-serve authority which controls growth according to water resources." The NCSD Board felt that the land use powers are the prominent controlling growth mechanism and that the Board may wish to respond to the article in the Telegram-Tribune.

QUESTION 1 Do you agree with the Coastal Commission's recommendation to return the Hearst Ranch to agricultural zoning and limit development to San Simeon Acres and San Simeon Village? Please explain.

Katcho Achadjian:

I would like to see the Hearst Ranch retain its current zoning. It is important that the very small amount of prime agricultural lands located on the ranch remain in Agricultural zoning but these prime agricultural areas are not slated for any development. I do not support development on San Simeon Point or in the pine forest, and in regards to development in San Simeon Acres and San Simeon village, I would like to keep the options open and see what plans are presented before making a decision,

Shirley Blanchi:

This is really three questions in one.

(a) A change of zoning is a quasi-judicial action on the part of either the Planning Commission or the Board of Supervisors. Because of that designation, for a member of the Commission or the Board to state publicly where one stands would give grounds to the applicant to require the member to step down on the basis that the applicant could not receive a fair and impartial hearing.

(b) Development adjacent to

San Simeon Acres has not received public review by the residents of San Simeon Acres. What do they want for their community?

(c) If San Simeon Village is old San Simeon, I would have to see what is being proposed. There has been no development plan application submitted to County Planning,

Harry Ovitt:

Questions 1 and 2 ask that I take a position on issues before all of the relevant information has been presented. To do so would not only be foolish (i.e. make a decision based on my "feelings" rather than on the "facts"), but might also be used by my proponents/opponents to show prejudice in whatever decision is ultimately made.

Peg Pinard:

It is important to know what are the valid underlying rights existing on the property. An agency, no matter how well intentioned, can't just take that away. Any changes need to be worked out with the property owner.

QUESTION 2 Do you agree with the Coastal Commission's recommendation to impose a development moratorium on Cambria after Jan. 1, 2002 unless a water management plan is implemented and other steps are taken? Please explain.

REVIEW ORDINANCE - BILLING PROCEDURE

ITEM

Review billing procedures - multi units with a single meter - account in tenant's vs. owner's name

BACKGROUND

At several locations in the District, there are cases where one meter serves two or more units. Problems arise when the landlord requires the account to be put in one tenant's name and the tenants are to share the bill. When one tenant is delinquent in paying the bill, both tenants are in jeopardy of having the water turned off and penalty charges added. To eliminate this problem, it is recommended that the account with this situation be kept in the owner's name or a separate meter set for each unit.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends that the Water Committee meet and review the District's billing procedures.
