BACKGROUND

Nipomo Community Services District has received conditional approval from LAFCO to operate and maintain parks within the current NCSD boundary. Additionally, NCSD has negotiated a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with the County of SLO to transfer property, at no charge, to build a Park at the northeast corner of Carrillo and West Tefft Streets, to the NCSD upon successful formation of an Assessment District to partially fund the operations and maintenance of the proposed park. Assessment District is to provide an appropriate revenue source to partially fund the on-going annual operation and maintenance costs of the proposed park.

In October 2009, the District successfully formed the Assessment District for Park Maintenance District No. 1, retained the Wallace Group to conduct the Assessment vote and scheduled a public hearing for December 16, 2009. On October 30, 2009, the District mailed Assessment ballots to all property owners within the Assessment District. The District held and informational meeting on November 30, 2009 at 6:30 p.m. to answer questions the public might have.

FISCAL IMPACT

Development of the Park district assessment project is in this year budget. If the Assessment passes, taxes will be levied in fiscal 2010/2011 and park construction will proceed at that time.





REVIEW OF PROGRAM ACTIVITIES FROM JULY THROUGH NOVEMBER 2009.

Review of water consumption. Note that the District uses a bi-monthly billing cycle, with one part of the District billed one month, and the other part of the District billed the next month. Each month's billing is for water delivered in the previous two months (water use billed in January will be for water delivered in November and December). In addition, the customers in the Town billing cycle tend to use less water per meter than the customers of the Mesa billing cycle.

"Urban Water" consists of the Department of Water Resources categories of single-family residence, multi-family residence, commercial-institutional, landscape, and other.



In addition to the customer categories shown graphically, water is used for flushing water mains.

Water Conservation Program Semi-Annual Review (C-4) December 4, 2009

In November and December 2008, 412,500 gallons of water were used for flushing.

From January through October 2009, 1,343,499 gallons were used for flushing.

Summary. Except for a dip in consumption in July-August 2008, the consumption remains typical for the NCSD, the shape of the curve remains typical for urban water consumption in our region's Mediterranean climate.

Water consumption for the first four billing cycles in 2007 and 2009 show a steady decrease. So far this year, the NCSD has used 199.49 acre-feet less than the same period in 2007 (-12% less).

Results of retrofit-at-time-of-sale plumbing retrofit program. The program is part of the measures enacted by the County of San Luis Obispo in support of the declared Level of Severity 3 for water resources in the Nipomo Mesa area. The program requires retrofitting of toilets flushing more than 1.6 gallons per flush (GPF) with 1.28-GPF toilets, and retrofitting showerheads using more than 2.5 gallons per minute (GPM) to showerheads using 2.5 GPM or less, upon sale of a residence in the Nipomo Mesa accomplished are submitted to SLO County Planning. As a courtesy to our customers, a step-by-step Homeowners' Guide was prepared, and it, along with the Verification Form, a map of the Nipomo Mesa Conservation Area, and links to the actual Title Amendment calling for the retrofits, are on the NCSD website. Notification of the website availability was mailed to real estate companies in the San Luis Obispo, Five-Cities, Nipomo and Santa Maria areas. The information is available to the public on our website, and has greatly decreased (or shortened the duration of) the number of questions and telephone calls we would have otherwise received.

The gallons-per-flush (GPF) savings depend on the GPF of the old toilet and the GPF of the new toilet. The County specifies retrofit to a 1.28 GPF (or less) toilet. Good-performance toilets of 0.8 GPF are on the market. Table 6 demonstrates the water savings from retrofits of various GPF old toilets to new 1.28 and 0.8 GPF toilets.

Out of 13 certifications for plumbing retrofit issued for the SLO County, 11 already had 1.28-GPF toilets, 2 were certified for retrofitted toilets, and 2 were were certified for retrofitted showerheads.

For the retrofitted toilets from June through November 2009, both toilet retrofits were NCSD customers. One of the toilets was for a toilet of 6.0 and one was for a toilet of 3.5.

The water saved from these two retrofits is 47.9 gallons per day, and over a 30-year period, the savings are 1.586 acre-feet per year (AFY).

Neither of the 2 showerheads replaced were for NCSD customers.

Estimated water savings for NCSD customers participating in the retrofit program, from January through November 2009 are 47.9 gallons per day, 17,225 gallons per year, and 1.586 AcFt for the life of the hardware. For all NCSD retrofits under this program, the estimated water saving are 139.34 gallons per day, 5,8959.1 gallons per year, and 3.030 AcFt for the life of the hardware.

ITEM

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Discuss the collection of supplemental water capacity charges for mixed use projects. [PROVIDE GUIDANCE, DIRECT STAFF]

BACKGROUND

Your Honorable Board directed staff to provide an opportunity for review and discussion of District procedure for collection of supplemental water capacity charges.

FISCAL IMPACT

Development of this material did use previously budgeted staff time and legal consulting cost.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends that the Board consider and discuss the current District policy and direct staff.

3.04.051 Payment of connection fees and capacity charges.

Except as provided in Section 3.04.052, below, the applicant shall pay the water capacity charges (including supplemental water capacity charges), sewer capacity charges, reimbursement charges (if applicable), meter fee and account set-up fee, collectively "Fees for Connection" as follows:

A. The applicant shall make a nonrefundable deposit ("Deposit") at the time the district issues a will-serve letter in an amount equal to the then calculated fees for connection.

B. The fees for connection shall be calculated and owing as of the date the district sets the water meter(s) to serve the affected property from which the amount of the deposit shall be deducted.

C. The district will set water meter(s) upon proof of a building permit from the County of San Luis Obispo and that the District has accepted improvements to be dedicated to the district, if applicable.

"Except where the applicant has either completed well improvements to be dedicated to the district and has development plans that have been approved by the district, paid all fees and charges based on said approved development plans, and has been issued a will-serve letter, or has development plans that have been approved by the district, paid all fees and charges based on said approved development plans, and has been issued a will-serve letter, the calculation of payment of "fees for connection" referenced in Section B, above, shall apply to all properties where a water meter has not been set by the district."

3.04.052 Payment of connection fees and capacity charges for commercial development.

For commercial projects developed on commercially-zoned properties within the district, the applicant shall pay the water capacity charges (including supplemental water capacity charges), sewer capacity charges, reimbursement charges (if applicable), meter fee and account set-up fee (collectively "Fees for Connection") as follows:

A. For commercial projects that do not meet the requirements of subparagraph B, below, the payment provisions of Section 3.04.051 shall apply.

B. For commercial projects under a single application for a final map, developed on two or more parcels, where one or more of the parcels requires a 1.5 inch or larger water meter, the following payment provisions shall apply.

1. The applicant shall make a nonrefundable deposit ("Deposit") at the time the district issues a will-serve letter in an amount equal to the total project fees for connection minus ninety percent of the water capacity charges attributed to supplemental water.

2. The remaining ninety percent of the project's supplemental water deposit shall be due and payable on the first of the following to occur:

a. Sale of any one of the parcels;

b. Applicant's request to set the first water meter at any one parcel; or

c. Eighteen months from the date the will-serve letter is issued.

3. Prior to issuing the will serve letter, applicant shall provide district, to the satisfaction of district legal counsel, the following:

a. A recordable document referencing Applicant's obligation for payment of Fees for Connection as outlined in this subparagraph B; and

3.04.021 Service limitations on LUO Amendments and other county approved density increases.*

A. The district will not approve intentto-serve letters or will-serve letters for water service to projects that require water demand beyond that required to serve the project consistent with the maximum zoning densities without consideration of density increases, as approved by the South County Area Plan - Inland (SCAP) as amended May, 2002 or any land use changes after May 2002 that creates a parcel less than five acres in size. For example, the district will not approve water service within its boundaries for projects whose water demands are increased due to general plan amendments, transfer density credits (TDC's), density bonuses, planning ordinance changes, or other discretionary increases in density.

B. The restrictions on water service shall be in effect until such time that supplemental water is delivered to the district or the court finds that the district is not restricted in pumping ground water to serve district residents.

*This is not implementing new policies but reaffirming those policies established by the District in its Urban Water Management Plan.

3.04.030 Landscape irrigation connections.

Except for connection to a single-family residence, a separate service connection with backflow prevention device shall be provided to each parcel of property for landscape irrigation. A separate landscape connection fee shall be computed pursuant to Section 3.04.050, and paid. (Ord. 98-87 § 9, 1998)

3.04.040 Meter size.

A. Except as provided in subsection B of this section, the water meter size for each service connection shall be determined by the district, pursuant to the then current Uniform Plumbing Code.

B. The minimum water meter size for each service connection that serves a singlefamily residence on one acre or larger parcel shall be one inch. (Ord. 2005-101 § 4, 2005; Ord. 98-87 § 10, 1998)

3.04.050 Connection fees.

A. New connections shall be subject to water connection fee/capacity charges based on the estimated reasonable cost of the district facilities to provide the service. These fees shall consist of the following component parts: capacity charges (including a supplemental water charge), meter fee, account set-up fee, and reimbursement charge, if applicable. These fees are established in Appendix A to this chapter.

B. Reimbursement Charges.

1. When a new service is connected to a district installed water line, the applicant shall be charged a front footage fee of twenty-one dollars per foot to each parcel fronting the improvements or one-half this amount when district service can be provided on both sides of the water line. Where the frontage has been subdivided, rear and front parcels are to share on a per parcel basis the frontage of the subdivision creating the parcels.

2. When a new service is connected to a developer-installed water line pursuant to Title 5, the applicant shall pay a supplemental charge pursuant to that reimbursement agreement.

C. The meter fee and account set-up fee shall be established and amended by resolution of the board of directors with
