- Public Notice of the proposed solid waste rate increase was mailed to customers during the week of December 21, 2012. A protest hearing on the proposed solid waste rate increase is scheduled to coincide with February 13, 2013 Regular Board Meeting. Eight written protests of the increase have been received to date.
- Duplicate billing at property owners request IS allowed by District policy. Staff is working with billing program contractor and developing a nominal fee to facilitate implementing the option. Staff expects to be offering the service to property owners, upon written request, by March 1, 2013.
- Ethics Training requirements and opportunities; Training for new Directors and training to meet the bi-annual requirement for Ethics Training have not been scheduled locally. Board to Consider Revision of District's Bill Payment Policy

On Wednesday, January 9th, the District's Board held their regular meeting at 9AM and directed staff to draft a revision of the District's policy to allow granting customer relief when an inadvertent leak results in a high water bill.

The current policy holds that all water metered to a customer is the customer's responsibility regardless of circumstance. When leaks occur and go undetected on the customer side of the water meter (from the meter to the residence), high water use and high water bills can result.

In November 2011, the Board approved a conservation water rate to raise water conservation awareness by charging a higher cost per unit as water use increases. In the event of a water leak, this rate may unfairly impact customers.

In an effort to better serve District Customers, the Board has directed staff to draft a revision to the District's Water Code to allow for relief when customers experience an unfortunate and infrequent leak in their system. The Board specified the draft would allow relief no more than once in a 36-month period. Further, relief will be calculated by charging the regular rate for water use equal to the customer's typical use and the District's lowest rate (Tier I) for the excess leak volume. Relief may only be granted to customers experiencing a leak after the policy is further reviewed and adopted by the Board, a process that will take approximately three months. Board Authorizes Purchase of New Service Truck

On Wednesday, January 9th, the District's Board held their regular meeting at 9AM and voted to approve the purchase of a Ford F550 Heavy Duty Utility Truck.

In order to continue to provide quality services to the Nipomo community, the new Heavy Duty Utility Truck will be used in the performance of preventive and emergency maintenance and repair of District facilities. The vehicle will be outfitted with a heavy duty crane to service District pumps, motors and other facilities in the field. The new vehicle will have sufficient tow capacity to handle the District's largest stand-by generator.

The District 2012-2013 budget authorized \$75,000 for the vehicle purchase. District staff compared several makes and models and received quotes from various dealers. The lowest quote for the vehicle was \$74,500 (\$80,174 with fees and tax) from a local Ford dealer. The Board authorized expenditure of \$81,000 and directed staff to purchase the F550 from Mullahey Ford in Arroyo Grande.

Board Authorizes Representation for Nipomo Mesa Management Area Technical Group

On Wednesday, January 9th, the District's Board heard a report on fall groundwater health and approved \$90,000 to continue contracts for technical representation on the court-appointed Nipomo Mesa Management Area Technical Group and its ongoing study of basin health.

The District's consultant, Dr. Brad Newton, reports that the fall 2012 Groundwater Index (a metric derived from depth measurements in over 40 area wells) is 16,000-Acre-Feet lower than last fall. Dr. Newton further cautioned that while the past 10 years have been wetter than long-term average, the trend of this Index and the NMMA Technical Group Index is in decline.

Boys soccer thriller: Titans, Pirates tie

• Brilliant goals, passionate play

This one had it all. Brilliant goals set up by perfectly executed passes. Passion exemplified by physical play, some shouting and a little shouting.

But after every thing was said and done, it ended just as it began. All tied up.

It was an exciting Los Padres League boys soccer match Tuesday night between Santa Ynez and Nipomo that ended in a not-so-thrilling 3-3 tie.

A victory, resulting in three LPL points instead of just one for the tie, would have benefited all but Santa Ynez or Nipomo goals. The Titans are now 2-2-2 in league, while the Pirates are 4-1-1.

"Two games in a row. Same thing happened against Cabrillo," said Nipomo coach Bill Vinodig.

The Titans defeated Cabrillo 4-3 last week in an LPL game that was eerily similar to Tuesday's match.

"It was the exact same scenario. The only difference was we were able to put an extra one in (the goal that time)," Vinodig said.

The Pirates won the LPL title last year and were expected to do the same this year. But, frankly, Santa Ynez hasn't lived up to the high expectations that success created, Santa Ynez coach Alex Uribe said.

Nipomo's Caleb Douze, playing on his home pitch, which primarily features chewed-up natural grass, opened the scoring in the ninth minute off a pass from Jesus Valdez.

A scoring drought that affected both teams until Santa Ynez's Diego Gutierrez broke it 1-0 goal and ripped a shot past Nipomo goalie Jacob Alvarado in the 47th minute. Nipomo wanted it the time jumping back on top. Three minutes after Santa Ynez tied it up, Nipomo earned a free kick.

Brian Jimenez set up a long, free-kick pass into the box. The ball found Brian Araujo on the left side. Araujo sent a bouncer on goal and it slipped past Santa Ynez keeper Eric Kelley.

Nipomo was up 2-1 with 30 minutes left in the game. Santa Ynez would have several chances to tie it back up but couldn't capitalize on any of them. That is, until the 75th minute.

Santa Ynez's star senior forward Alex Uribe, son of

coach Alex Uribe, made a nice run down the left sideline, spun toward the middle of the pitch and sent a pass to a teammate who bounced the ball right to junior Noah Blacher.

He then sent a dribbler past Alvarado to tie up the game with just five minutes left in regulation.

But just like before, Nipomo jumped right back on top. Setting up another free kick in the 78th minute.

Araujo kicked a pass into the box from the right corner. His beautiful cross came right to Douze, and he sent a straight bar kick bouncing high off the grass and into the far side of the goal to make it 3-2.

It seemed Titans had just sealed up a big LPL win,

right? Not so fast. This time it was the Pirates who bounced right back.

On the kickoff, Santa Ynez would get the ball into the penalty area, and a Pirate put a shot on goal that was blocked, sending it into the air where it was touched by a Nipomo player's hand.

The referee ruled it a hand-ball, which then resulted in a penalty kick. Blacher ripped his PK into the left side of the goal to tie the score at 3-3.

The two 30-minute periods that make up the overtime were eventful, with both teams having decent chances on goal, but neither squad had enough left in the tank to score.

The Titans were scheduled to host Santa Maria on Thursday, but results were not available at press time.

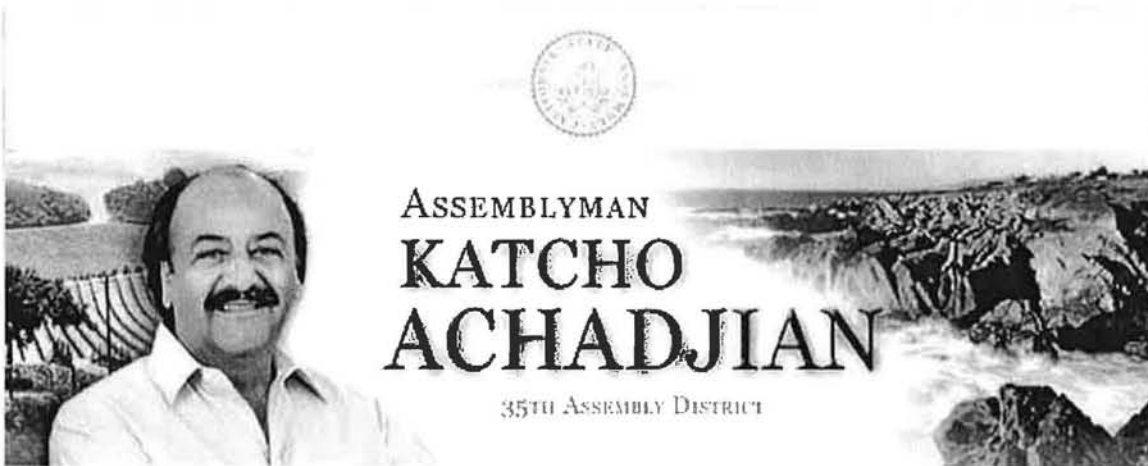

Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Day - A Day of Service

On January 21st, our country will pause to reflect on the legacy and accomplishments of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., whose tireless efforts to fight for racial equality and a just society have forever shaped our national heritage and future.

For too long in our country's history, racism and government-sponsored segregation permeated communities throughout America, depriving friends and neighbors of basic rights guaranteed under the Constitution, such as the right to vote without fear of intimidation, the right to enroll their kids in the best schools, and the simple right to travel wherever they would like to go.

Dr. King, however, envisioned an America based not on the color of one's skin, but on the content of his or her character. He dreamed that one day every citizen, regardless of creed or race, would be able to live out the unalienable rights of life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness enshrined in the Declaration of Independence.

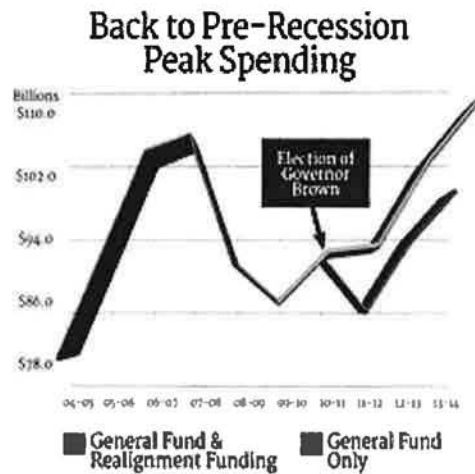

Governor Brown Unveils 2013/14 Budget Proposal

The Governor's proposed 2013-14 budget was released on January 10th as required by law. The spending plan represents the first budget since California voters approved \$50 billion in tax increases. Regardless of one's position on Proposition 30, the budget proposal represents a significant milestone as it is the first in many years that appears to be balanced and one that does not rely on unrealistic revenue projections and accounting gimmicks.

I am especially pleased that the Governor's proposal fully funds K-12 Education on compliance with the Proposition 98 guarantee. Additionally, after years of fee increases, I am supportive of the Governor's plan to reinstate cuts made to the CSU and UC systems in previous budget years and his proposal to freeze student fees for the next six years.

While there is plenty of good news in the Governor's budget proposal, it is important that the Legislature exercise considerable restraint and hold the line when it comes to new spending. This is especially important given that a comparison of General Fund spending shows that spending on all programs that were General Fund programs when the Governor was first elected has hit an all-time high of \$103.6 billion. By working together we can fund important government services, pay down our debt, and set the stage for an extended era of fiscal responsibility and balanced budgets.



Prior to Governor Brown's first budget, public safety programs subject to realignment were funded through the General Fund. Therefore, an accurate comparison of General Fund spending requires that Realignment funding be included in subsequent budgets.

Paso Robles Job Skills Program Raises Hope for Kids

Recently, I had the distinct pleasure of visiting the Oak Park Housing Development in Paso Robles and saw firsthand the quality programming that provides critical job skill training to young local residents.

Operating under the principle that job skills are an integral part of a young person's education, the Paso Robles YouthWorks Program equips youth from grammar school to college age with critical knowhow to ease their entry into the job market.

Upon my arrival every young person in the program greeted me with a firm handshake and looked me in the eye as they introduced themselves. These students take on increasingly responsible work and took obvious pride in demonstrating the wide range of skills they were engaged in while earning pay and gaining valuable experience to enhance opportunities for future employment.

I was joined by San Luis Obispo County Sheriff Ian Parkinson and Supervisors Mecham and Teixeira on the tour and all of us walked away encouraged by the progress of YouthWorks and committed to working toward their future success.

An Important Reminder for Federal Benefit Check Recipients

The U.S. Department of Treasury needs your help getting the word out on changes to Federal Benefit Checks. If you, or someone you know, receive a paper check for Social Security or any other federal benefit payments, **March 1, 2013** is the deadline to switch to an electronic payment.

Federal Benefit recipients have two electronic payment options:

Direct Deposit allows monthly payment to automatically be deposited into their checking or savings account each month on the scheduled payment date.

Direct Express Debit MasterCard allows money to be posted to the card account on the payment day each month for those who do not have a bank account or prefer a prepaid debit card. There are no sign-up fees, overdraft fees or monthly service fees. Some fees for optional services may apply.

There are three free and easy ways to make the switch to direct deposit or the Direct Express Debit MasterCard:

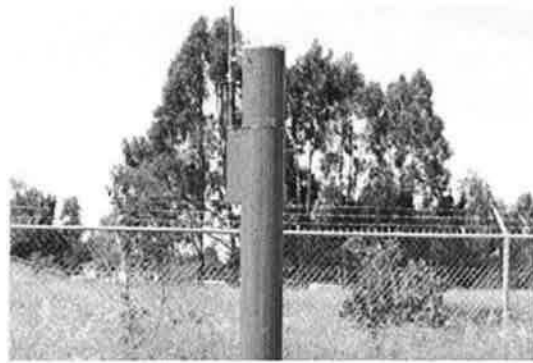

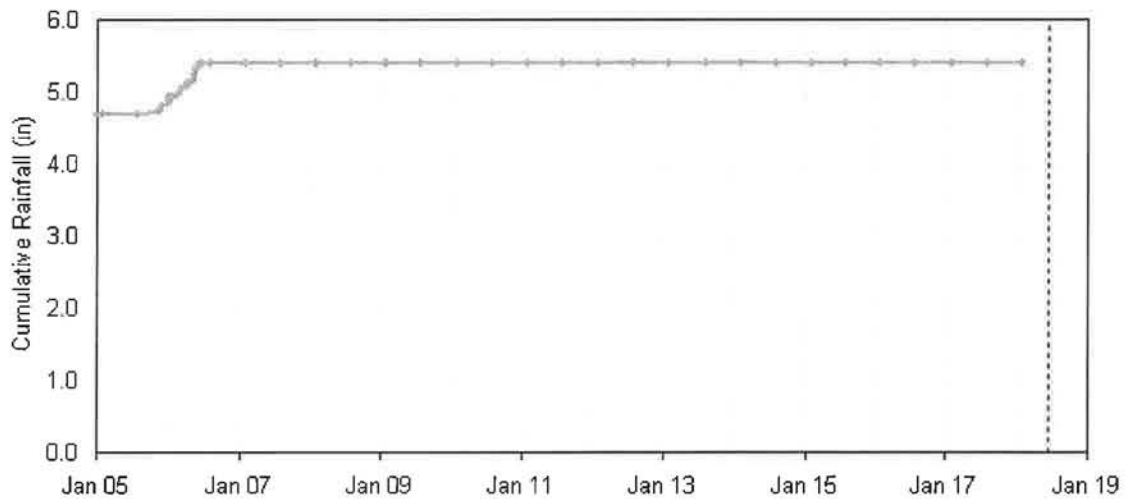

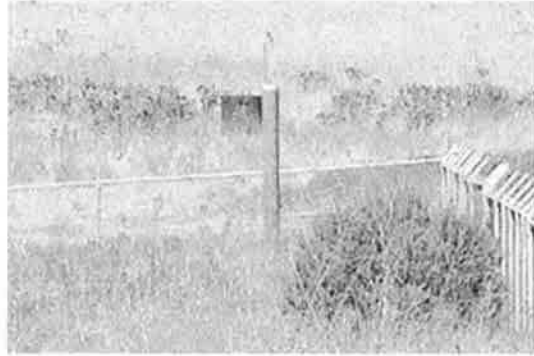

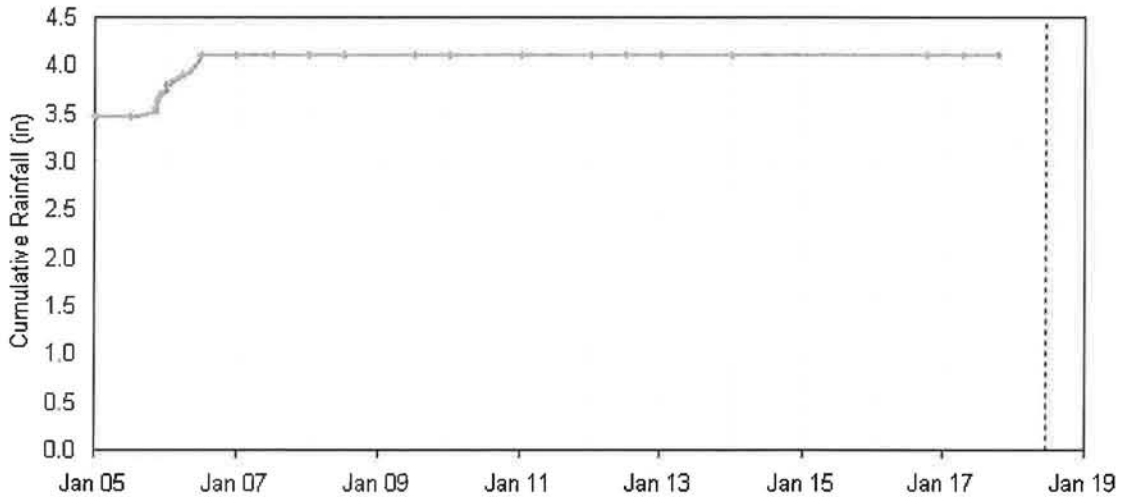
