GENERAL MANAGER'S REPORT

ITEM

Standing report to your Honorable Board -- Period covered by this report is April 6, 2013 through April 19, 2013.

DISTRICT BUSINESS

Administrative

- Supplemental Water Project Phase 1 is on schedule for construction contract award on May 22, 2013. An updated schedule and project cost summary (2005 – March 2013) is attached.
- A customer was granted relief from a high water bill in accordance with the District's recently adopted policy. The customer's average water use for the March billing period over the past eight years is 20 units. In March 2013 a leak resulted in a metered use of 557 units and a usage charge of over \$2,700. Application of the Board's policy resulted in forgiveness of 52% of the bill (\$1,492) resulting in a revised usage charge of \$1,242.
- Development of District 2013-2014 Budget is proceeding. The 2013-2014 Budget outlines projected Operating expenditures of nearly \$8 million and Non-Operating expenditures of \$29 million. Making this the largest proposed Budget in the District's nearly 50 year history. Finance and Audit Committee reviewed the first draft of the proposed Budget on April 17, 2013. The proposed draft Budget is posted on the District website within the Committee's Agenda materials for the April 17 meeting. A public workshop to review the proposed Budget will be conducted at 1pm on May 8, 2013 concurrent with the Regular Board Meeting.
- The District responded to an April 12 request by California Special District Association (CSDA) to write letters opposing aspects of Assembly Bill 690. The request, District letter, and follow up from CSDA regarding success of the effort is attached.
- Local Area Formation Commission (LAFCO) transmitted their proposed 2013-2014 Budget (attached). Collectively, Special Districts fund one-third (~\$155,000) of the LAFCO budget. The District share of LAFCO budget in 2013-2014 will be approximately \$22,000.
- Most recent data from Nipomo area County rain gauges recorded no rain during the reporting period. The Nipomo South gauge (Sensor 730) is reporting 7 inches of cumulative rain fall this season or 44% of the 16 inch annual average. The Nipomo North gauge (Sensor 730) is reporting 6 inches of cumulative rain fall this season or 33% of the 18 inch annual average. Twitchell Reservoir reports 0.0% capacity (at gauge minimum); Lopez Lake stands at 73.8% capacity (36,462 Acre-feet).
- High efficiency washer rebate program continues with twenty-two rebates (\$1,650) issued this fiscal year.

Bill Diverts Property Tax From Core Services and Infrastructure

CSDA urges opposition letters to <u>Assembly Bill 690</u> (Campos). This bill would allow the diversion of local property taxes from special districts and other local agencies without their consent.

While the intent of AB 690 is to create a Jobs and Infrastructure District (JID) program for the purpose of stimulating the economy, it severely undermines the very jobs and infrastructure it intends to promote. Furthermore, AB 690 lacks accountability and discourages local agency collaboration.

CSDA opposes this legislation unless it is amended to align with current law requiring local agencies' consent prior to the diversion of property taxes, and CSDA encourages amendments that bring about local agency partnerships for community revitalization projects.

Dear Assembly Member Achadjian:

On behalf of the board members of Nipomo Community Services District, I am writing to respectfully oppose Assembly Bill 690 (Campos) unless it is amended to restore the provision in Government Code Section 53395.19, which under current law requires local agencies' consent prior to the diversion of the property taxes that fund the local services and infrastructure those agencies deliver.

Nipomo Community Services District is responsible for delivering safe and clean drinking water to its customers. Due to the overdraft of our groundwater basin, the Board of Directors is scheduled to award contracts to <u>build a \$17,000,000 Supplemental Water Project</u> next month (May 2013). The District's property tax allocation is a critical and key component in funding for this project. We provide some of the very services and infrastructure that AB 690 seeks to promote, including constructing \$17,000,000 in infrastructure. By diverting local property taxes, AB 690 would undermine the funding source of the very services and infrastructure it intends to support.

Property tax increment revenues would be most effectively used when the entities delivering the core services are given the *option* to participate. We believe that this will first and foremost ensure the safe and reliable delivery of core local services, but will additionally increase the accountability of property tax increment financed projects—a win-win for Californians.

Nipomo Community Services District relies upon property tax revenues as a firm financial foundation to build the infrastructure necessary to maintain a strong economy and healthy environment.

Our District relies on property taxes in order to assist in building the \$17,000,000 infrastructure and securing and repayment of the most cost-effective bonds for infrastructure projects. AB 690 would severely impact these benefits and directly result in substantially higher rates on our water customers, imposing a painful, regressive burden on working families.

The opposition was enough that the bill has now been amended to be aligned with current law requiring local agencies' consent prior to property tax revenue diversion for the creation of a Jobs and Infrastructure District (JID) program, should AB 690 be signed into law.
