## NEW OFFICE BUILDING CONTRACT



Dear Honorable Board:

On September 3, 1997, your Board, at my request continued an item that was asking you to find Deferville Construction Inc. in default of their construction contract for the construction of the District Office Building. This letter is to appraise you of the progress that is being made towards finalizing the contract. On Wednesday, September 10th, I met with Steve Deferville at the site to go over the final issues that remained to be completed or repaired. The days following that meeting Deferville Construction, or their sub-contractors, have been tending to those items

There are two items from sub-contractors that are in contention. In both cases the sub-contractors are asking for additional compensation for work that they have performed. In both cases it is obvious that some of the work is warranted, it was required, and the District benefited. The difficulty lies with a few items that do not appear to have been warranted, were probably not required. Whether the District benefited or not is not necessarily important if the District did not have any control over the additional work. We are currently reviewing these items and will have a final report prepared for your next Board meeting.

I feel progress is being made to finalize this project. Deferville is in contact with me almost daily. The list of items to be attended to is diminishing but there still are several items that need to be completed prior to determining that the construction is complete.

## Potpourri

# **Study Calls for Science-Based ESA**

To the general public, the federal Endangered Species Act is one of the most popular environmental laws on the books. But despite its popularity, the 1973 law may also be one of the most ineffective.

That's bad news for the species the act is aimed at helping.

It's also bad news for property owners and local governments — the sources for most of the efforts and funds to protect listed species.

The act has repeatedly been used to restrict the use of property owned by individuals and local governments all over the nation in the name of helping endangered plants and animals.

Those who have been affected say it's unfair to ask them to bear all the cost of protecting wildlife — it should be a national responsibility. Their claims become even stronger if, after all their sacfices, the act itself isn't really helping

indangered species too much.

Robert Gordon, James Streeter and James Lacy, analysts at the National Wilderness Institute, spent more than a year looking at data on the Endangered Species Act.

Their findings were reported recently in an article in Environment International, a peer-review scientific journal.

The results were stunning:

• Numerous species were incorrectly listed as threatened or endangered.

• No species has recovered primarily as a result of the ESA.

• In only two instances can reclassification of a species from endangered to threatened be attributed to successful management actions and in both cases the actions could have been taken without the act.

• Most of the species claimed by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service to have achieved 75% recovery objectives are not beneficiaries of successful actions taken under the act.

• The government data is too poor to demonstrate a general trend for protected species — either positive or negative.

• Federal expenditures on endangered species are made primarily by agencies other than the USFWS or NMFS, the two agencies responsible for implementing the ESA.

• There is no scientific rationale for the allocation of funds among species.

"Government data show the ESA program to be a failure — it could be likened to a doctor who has committed innumerable misdiagnoses, is quick to elect radical surgery and has never saved a patient," said Gordon, the executive director of NWI.

Supporters of the act have claimed several success stories, species that have been removed from the list and termed "recovered." But the study disputes those claims of amazing comebacks for species on the brink of extinction.

The NWI analysts say that in some of the cases cited as recovered, "there is little demonstrable change in the species conditions which is attributable to anything other than data error."

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In other words, the species were more numerous than originally thought and were likely listed by mistake. For example, the American alligator has seen its numbers increase. But the study says its population was larger than believed to begin with.


The gray whale's numbers have climbed, but this trend began before the species act was passed. A similar story is true for the Arctic peregrine falcon and the brown pelican.

Twenty-two species have been upgraded from endangered to threatened. But NWI says that most of these upgrades are again due to better data or factors other than management under the ESA. The study reveals a disturbing fact — many species have been listed by mistake or for political purposes.

The mistakes have serious consequences. If the species in question isn't really endangered, the benefits of listing it are likely very small, but for those affected the costs can be enormous.

Congress has been putting off reauthorizing the ESA for several years now, but it needs to take up the task. The Clinton administration has let be known it supports changing the act.

NWI says protecting species is an important and noble goal but when Congress gets around to renewing the ESA it should guarantee that future actions will be based on good science — not to mention good economics.
