If a majority of property owners and tenants oppose the plan to raise rates, the NCSD cannot raise rates and will have to look in-house at exorbitant salaries and out-of-control spending to clean up their own financial shortfall.

Notices on the proposed rate increase will be mailed out to property owners and tenants starting Friday, July 29. All protests to the rate hike must be submitted by the end of the public hearing on Oct. 12. The Nipomo community cannot continue to support NCSD through rate hikes and
